

Closer look on what S.L.U.G is, how we started, and our growth!


This is a student led project for grades

readiness education (including trade
school) & increase knowledge and
awareness of the importance on mental
health. Receive up to \$1,000 in funds.

 When S.L.U.G first started it was focused only for <u>High School</u> <u>students</u> that would use the award for College & Career Readiness. Our Growth:

In the school year 23/24 San Pablo Youth Commission voted to extend the grant to Elementary school, Middle school, and include the focus on promoting positive mental health!

Schools that participated in S.L.U.G & Our Budget:


During the 2024-2025 school year, the Student- Led Unity Grant had 8 awardees.

 Helms Middle School was the only middle school that applied.
 Riverside, Dover, Lake, and Bayview were the elementary schools that applied. Richmond High School was the only high school that applied.
 Lastly, Discovering the Reality of Our Community (DROC) was the only organization that applied.

Here's what Helms Middle School did:

- Helms Middle School held a <u>College</u>
 & <u>Career Event!</u> They had 4 reps
 from the <u>College and Career Center</u>
 that <u>introduced college access</u>
 <u>programs to the students.</u>
- The 80 students that participated were able to explore different career pathways such as health, law enforcement, culinary, animation, law, author/writers, and music.
- Students also used their funds towards a <u>student led college tour</u> <u>at UC Berkeley!</u>













Here's what Dover Elementary did:

- Dover Elementary leaders <u>launched the</u> <u>start of Dover Buddies</u> and <u>Recess</u>
 <u>Committee!</u>
- Dover Buddies over 35 students that needed extra support had student led counseling, and educational/fun activities!
- Recess Committee involved the leader's organizing activities during recess for lower grades each Friday!
- The grant helped provide supplies and new activities for both programs. The rest of the funds were used for a retreat for the Dover Leaders.











Here's what Riverside Elementary did:

- Riverside student's running the Student
 Activity & Leadership Team (SALT) used
 the funds to hold a two-day Wellness
 Workshop Series for lower grade
 students, <u>TK through 3rd grade!</u>
- This series was aimed towards promoting emotional awareness, selfexpression, empathy, and mental wellbeing through engaging, ageappropriate activities!
- The success of the workshop with the funds led to SALT recommending these Wellness Workship Series to be an annual event!







Here's what Lake Elementary did:

- Students at Lake Elementary
 School used the funds towards
 an educational reptile show
 from East Bay Vivarium!
- Students were very engaged with the show, and learned about the different reptiles and spiders Owen (the host) brought.





Here's what Bayview Elementary did:

- A group of students at Bayview Elementary School used the funds towards a College Tour at San Francisco State University!
- After the tour, students were asked to create a presentation on what they learned from their visit to SFSU and present it to Bayview students.
 - Students bought shirts to wear at the presentation, and they also bought stickers to give out to students at the presentation!



Here's what Discovering the Reality of Our Community did:

- DROC used their award to host a studentled Youth Against Addiction Event at Richmond High School.
 - Their funds helped organize the event and even hold a raffle to win earphones!
- They had guest speakers, alcohol preemption presentation, workshops, a mindfulness corner, non-profit organizations table, informative games, resources that relate to rehabilitation and alcohol prevention in the Bay Area, as well as ways to get involved in our smaller community!
- The funds were also used to <u>purchase shirts</u>
 to <u>wear during the events and snacks for</u>
 those who attended.
















Here's what Richmond High School-Holistic Hike did:

- Richmond High School students that are part of the Youth Public Safety Academy (YPSA) used their funds to plan a <u>hiking trip</u> to Kennedy Grove!
- They also used their award to have a BBQ prior to the hike, to ensure their bodies were nourished and fueled with nutrients filled food to be ready for their hike.



Here's what Richmond High School-Public Safety did:

- Richmond Oiler's is part of the Youth Public Safety Academy (YPSA) and they used their award to take an Alcatraz Study Trip, host a Community College (CCC, DVC, LMC) **Educational Presentation for the** Health and Law field. They also were able to have two study trips with their award: San Pablo Police **Department and Richmond Fire Department!**
 - Students learned information
 about the fields and what's
 required to pursue those careers.
