


BUSH AVENUE NEIGHBORHOOD POCKET PARK

Project Background




Location: 1701 Bush Ave. Intersection of 17th Street and Bush Ave

- This site is a 0.13-acre vacant lot that was previously a single-family home
- The vacant lot has been a magnet for litter and illegal dumping and general blight
- The City of San Pablo purchased the vacant lot in 2019 with the intention of transforming it into a neighborhood pocket park

- ADA-accessible path
- Play Structure
- Swings*
- Fitness Station*
- Cube Seating*
- Water Fountain (with bottle refill and pet fountain)*
- Bike Racks
- Shade Sails
- Trash Receptacles
- Park Sign

Facility Naming Policy

Policy Procedure

- Create a "Facility Naming List" of appropriate names solicited by public or other sources; and
- 2. All names are reviewed by the CSSC* and then at least three (3) names are presented to the City Council as a recommendation; and
- 3. The City Council approves a name for a new City facility by majority vote (via Resolution)

Facility Naming Policy (cont.)

• Priorities to be considered in naming of all City facilities, including parks and recreation facilities include <u>in order of importance</u>, the following policy criteria, as follows:

Category I: Historic Names

Category II: Places and Feature Names

Category III: Individuals, Groups, or Organizations

Category I: Historic Names

Martina Castro Park

- Historic family name, Maria Martina Castro (1814-1875), holds significant importance in the history of San Pablo
- Daughter of Francisco Maria Castro and Gabrielle Berryessa de Peralta, grantees of the Rancho San Pablo land grant
- She was recognized as the "First Lady of Rancho San Pablo"
- Martina Castro initially left San Pablo to marry the Mexican Governor of Alta California, Juan B. Alvarado, before returning to become the most prominent woman in San Pablo during the early American era

Category II: Places and Feature Names

Old Town Park

- The new pocket park is situated in the Old Town Neighborhood
- A significant portion of the residents living in close proximity to the area are not familiar with the neighborhood being referred to as "Old Town"
- "Old Town Park" may contribute to fostering a distinct sense of community but also serve to acknowledge and reinforce the identity of the neighborhood.



Category III: Individuals, Groups, Organizations

Happy Friday Park In Honor of Jorge Rueda



- Dedicated and ongoing volunteer at E.M. Downer Elementary School since 1997
- Affectionately known as the "Happy Friday Guy" within the Downer school community
- Social Activist:
 - Organized parent group for March 4 Education in 2004 and led a 70-mile march from San Pablo to Sacramento to raise awareness about financial challenges in the West Contra Costa Unified School District
- Recognized by the City of San Pablo in 2014 with a "Certificate of Special Recognition" for:
 - Providing Thanksgiving dinners to local families
 - Teaching cooking and baking classes to parents and community members
- Initiated and led the Running Club at Downer Elementary, promoting healthy lifestyles and supplying school materials to student participants
